Students are closely supervised by museum staff, teachers, accompanying adults and volunteers. Museum Guides use group management skills to manoeuvre groups safely around site, avoiding potential hazards. Important points about safety and safe conduct are highlighted prior to tours and repeated by Museum Guides throughout the tour if necessary. |

Exposure to an outdoor/garden environment. | It is the responsibility of schools to ensure that all students have appropriate sun protection including hats and sunscreen and rain gear in wet weather. An undercover area is provided at Narryna for an introduction to the house, however, visitors will be exposed to weather when walking around the outside of the building. It is advisable that student also bring their own food and drink for their visit. |
| | | | 4. Stings by bee or other insect. | Narryna's gardens have a range of flowers which attract bees and other insects. The Museum does not have Epipens as part of its First Aid kit, it is the responsibility of schools to provide Epipens for their students who may suffer an allergic reaction in the rare case of stinging. |
| | | | 5. Ongoing heritage maintenance work. | If a risk is identified the areas are closed off, fenced, and signed; all workers will have been inducted into the public nature of the site, contractors made aware that students will be on site and teachers will be informed of any ongoing work and areas to avoid. School groups are required to adhere to safety barriers and signs and keep a safe distance from work sites and machinery. |

| | Narryna staff and volunteers will undertake guided tours of the house with students.
